FPC-Holt Leadership Retreat







Holt Community Food Bank News

October is a month of transition and change. This year though, it's much more than fall colors at the Food Bank.

Starting Oct. 14, the Food Bank welcomes a new coordinator to the ministry: Marnie Swanson. Marnie is a Holt resident with a 6th grade daughter and she'll be working on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. As a part-time coordinator, she's not exactly *replacing* Bonnie (like that could happen!), but Bonnie and Maury will be leaving for Florida soon after Marnie's arrival – and they plan on parking poolside with a little more gusto this year! (Bonnie and Maury will still be very involved with the Food Bank and Maury is still Vice President.)

30 Day Mustard Seed Challenge

"If you have faith the size of a mustard seed...nothing will be impossible for you" (Matthew 17:20)

God can use even a small act of faith to create a large impact on you and on your world.

A new, and ongoing contribution to the Bagpipe by one of our members, The Mustard Seed Challenge is a call to see the world through the lens of scripture – a verse or two at a time.

"Indeed, the word of God is living and active, sharper than any twoedged sword, piercing until it divides soul from spirit, joints from marrow; it is able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart." (Heb. 4:12)



When you are obedient to the Bible's words of wisdom, it can change your heart and mind.

It is common belief that a new habit takes 30 days to create. So – if you were to accept the challenge to MEMORIZE one verse of scripture AND APPLY it every day, what changes will happen in your life and in the world around you? This is your invitation to take this 30-day challenge and see what God can do with even a Mustard Seed.

Fruits of the Spirit – God's Imprint on Our Heart

Memory Verse: Galatians 5:22 "The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control"

In upcoming Mustard Seed Challenges, we will be examining the fruits one at a time.

Goal: When we welcome Jesus Christ into our hearts and give our lives to God, we're more aware of how God places the Holy Spirit inside us and empowers us to live a whole new way. "But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. (Romans 8:9a) It is an awareness God brings alive in us from the moment we invite Jesus into our heart. So much of what God does is not humanly understandable, and this is one of those mysteries... God enters our hearts and transforms us from deep inside -- giving us the power to become more like Jesus. Our response is to become aware of God guiding and directing us and to obey that leading from God. "If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit." (Galatians 5:25) However, we are also earthly humans who have earthly desires, which means that God's Spirit is often battling with our own flesh desires and tendencies. Paul refers to this battle in Romans 7:14-25. "with my mind I am slave to the law of God, but with my flesh I am slave to the law of sin." (Rom 7:25b) The goal is to anchor deeply into God's

Holy Spirit and tune into Jesus' voice of love and guidance. "My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me." (John 10:27)



Challenge: Memorize Galatians 5:22 (above). Anchor deeply into these fruits of God's Spirit and practice yielding to the ways you believe God is leading you. The Bible compares us to clay being shaped by God as in Isaiah 64:8 – "Yet, O LORD, you are our Father: we are the clay, and you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand." Our job as the clay is to yield to the potter (God).

Prayer: Sustaining God, place your Spirit into my heart in a renewed way and let me feel your deep love for me. I need your sustaining holy presence in my heart and in my life as much as I need my breath. Help me to yield myself and my actions to you

that I may become a true witness to your Holy Spirit in me. Guide me and bless me as I intentionally seek to do your will in my life. In the name of Jesus Christ. Amen.

Ideas for implementing the Mustard Seed Challenge and making it work in your life:

- When memorizing the verse, go at your own pace. Write it on a sticky note and put it where you will see it daily. Break it into segments. Repetition is the key. Give yourself time and grace.
- Begin a Mustard Seed Journal where you write the memory verse and what you discover about yourself as you
 implement it in your life. Set some reasonable goals for yourself in order to meet the challenge and record your journey
 of growth.
- Ask someone to do the challenge with you as a prayer and accountability partner. Share with each other the challenges that you have as you implement the Bible verse into your daily life. Encourage and pray for each other.
- Begin with smaller goals like creating certain time segments where you concentrate on the challenge; then add more time segments. Or concentrate on how you think about one area (like yourself) first – then expand it to other areas in your life.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM CAMP GREENWOOD

- Summer camp went extraordinarily well! We had 127 campers, an increase of 9% from last year. Children and youth came home with rave reviews!
- 2. 2019-2021 Capital Campaign: as of 8/31/19 we have raised \$26,350 of our \$1,000,000 goal (2.6%). We need a LOT more. We need large donations, medium donations, small donations whatever you can afford. We can accept checks, credit cards, PayPal, and more. To continue to use the property we much purchase it from the Presbytery of Lake Michigan for \$692,500 by the end of 2021. Otherwise, the presbytery will sell the property to the highest bidder, and the camp will close.
- 3. At the September Presbytery meeting, various outlying portions of the camp were approved for sale, none of which impact camp operations. A new lease with an option to purchase was also finalized this summer, allowing us to continue to use the main camp and North Point through the end of 2021.
- 4. Our Annual Meeting will be on October 19 at 1 pm at the camp. Come early for an end-of-camp workday at 9 am to help us get the camp ready for the winter season (breakfast and lunch provided). Elections will be held for new board members. Anyone who donated \$25 or more in 2018 is eligible to vote. All friends of the camp are welcome to attend.
- 5. Amazon.com will give 1% of the value of any purchases you make to Camp Greenwood if you select Greenwood Ministries Association on smile.amazon.com and then make your purchases on smile.amazon.com instead of amazon.com. You can get the same products at the same prices with the same benefits but if you do it this way, Camp Greenwood gets a boost, every single time you place a new order.
- 6. The camp is available for rent! Rent a cabin, rent the retreat center, rent the dining hall, rent as much as you want! Proceeds from rentals help support the camp.

As the program year kicks-off for our children and youth with excitement and joy, I'd like to bring that same excitement and joy to educational programming for adults. I am gushing with ideas, but I would like a better sense of the opportunities that you all would enjoy. So, below is some space for you to imagine with me. 
